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In this number of Transversal: International Journal for the Historiography of Science, in addition to the regular issue with articles and other sections, we have a special issue on Ian Hacking (1936-2023), edited by Prof. María Laura Martinez from the Universidad de la República of Uruguay. Our honoree passed away shortly after we announced a call for articles for a special issue in his honor. Prof. Leite teaches philosophy of science at the Federal University of São João Del Rei – UFSJ. He graduated in philosophy from the University of São Paulo – USP, where he obtained his Ph.D. We wish them a rich and stimulating experience editing Transversal.

Indeed, this direct relationship between, on the one hand, authors who believed in our journal as a venue for publishing their research and, on the other, a valuable team of assistant editors is what has given us the strength and enthusiasm needed to face the difficulties, enjoy the happiness of the results, and seek the consolidation of this editorial project.
